


Scholar Timothy H. Ung to remain at CU School of Medicine for neurosurgery residency His aim is to improve therapeutic methods for treating

deadly malignant brain tumors such as glioblastoma. Current treatment options for glioblastoma are unsatisfactory, and Ung is taking up the challenge for the next generation of neurosurgeons to do better. In his first two years of medical school, Ung participated in three research projects that included both basic and clinical activities. Between his third and fourth years, he completed a neurosurgery research fellowship at Columbia University, working with a renowned specialist on the use of a fluorescent dye to assist surgical removal of tumor tissue. The project has led to multiple publications and presenta-

tions at professional meetings and is seen as a promising advancement. Ung considers it a tremendous privilege to have had the critical support of the ARCS Founda-


Amy Davis created an enduring legacy

Musk and scientists from his companies SpaceX and Tesla developed the concept of aluminum capsules traveling through low-pressure tubes at more than 750 miles per hour, then invited anyone interested to create design ideas for the capsules. CU Denver's 12-member Team HyperLynx was among over 700 teams from the U.S., Canada, and Europe who submitted preliminary designs, and it is one of only 30 to win an opportunity to build and test its vehicle. The team is now hard at work constructing its prototype capsule and preparing for the upcoming performance competition on a 1 mile test track being built in Hawthorne, California.


